On Monday morning I woke to the first mention I had heard of a storm coming. By Tuesday afternoon we were preparing for the blast of Typhoon Ketsana. Most people were busy preparing for high winds and were not too concerned about the possibility of flood, because it was very early in the wet season, and there had not been any prolonged or very heavy rain yet. Wednesday morning dawned on a flooded city. The cause of the 3.5m flash flood varies from (A) tidal surges stopped the rainwater from flowing into the sea (B) a dam in the catchment area broke (C) extreme upstream deforestation. The ceiling in the room where Binh was sleeping at the office as security guard, collapsed onto his bed. Fortunately he was not there at the time. The rate of rainfall on the third floor garden of the office building, exceeded the capacity of the drains, resulting in an impromptu staircase-waterfall feature inside the office. As the flood water was lapping the ground floor of the clinic, each time a truck went by ferrying stranded residents, the wash from the truck came into the clinic. But it's hard to feel sorry for ourselves when we can see so many of our neighbours who lost everything except the clothes they were standing in, and indeed there were reportedly 9 deaths in our province. For the next 2 weeks at least, I can see us diverting most of our resources to disaster relief.

The 9th Storm by Van our physio

27th, September, CHIA organized mid- Autumn festival for children in Duy Thu and Duy Tan ward in Duy Xuyen province. The weather was wonderful. I had a day off on the next day and it was raining heavily and very windy. The next morning, I couldn't go to work because of the heavy rain and wind. The wind blew the trees down across the road. At that time, the weather forecast said at 1-2pm the storm would hit Quang Ngai. We immediately prepared sand bags to protect our house, the gas shop and its roof. But the wind was too strong and the gas shop roof was blown away. The rain water rapidly rose and flooded the fish pond and the fish tank away and our gas tanks were washed away. The flood water rose up rapidly that night and we thought we had to save ourselves first. We sat on chairs and weren't able to do anything to save our property from the rising water. And we could only watch them float away. During the three days of flooding we had only instant noodle to eat. It was the most frightening experience that I have ever had in my life and I will never forget.

All in a word

The word "typhoon" might come from the Hakka dialect phrase "tai foon", or the Cantonese phrase "dai fung", OR the Mandarin "tai feng," all with the meaning "Big Wind"

Other possible origins of the word include the Greek Typhon, the god of the winds, who personifies storm thunder winds. The Arabic, Persian, and Hindi terms *tufan* may have been borrowed from the Greek. In old Turkic script the word Tufan is also recorded.

Being a girl with congenital disability and born into a poor family, Phuong is a brave girl who overcomes these difficulties with ease. Phuong is studying grade 11 now, and performs very well at school. It is difficult to travel from Hoi An to Duy Xuyen everyday to study, so the family has made it more convenient for her by renting a small room in Hoi An. She returns home at weekends. Although it is difficult for her to move , Phuong does her best to walk independently. However, she goes to school and to study some extra classes by a push me-pull me wheelchair. Phuong is really a strong and confident girl, she always smiles and doesn't feel ashamed because of her legs. In Hoi An, she does everything to take care of herself such as going to the market to buy food for cooking, washing her own clothes and cleaning her home.

To treat Phuong's condition, her family spent a lot of money taking her to many hospitals to be assessed, but the doctors couldn't do anything. Phuong's father has disability also, but he does his best to earn money as a building worker. The mother stays at home to make mats and then sells them in the market. Their income can barely cover the family's expenses, but hardly for Phuong's school fee. When you enter her house, you do not see any possessions inside except a bed, and one feels that this house can easily blow away or fall down in a typhoon. Though living under many difficult circumstances, Phuong is still a positive and happy girl. She is pleased with what she has and accepts it comfortably. She is a incredible girl and worthy of an education. CHIA is looking for a sponsor for Phuong to ensure that she can stay in school.

Did you know Over 110 million of the world's children, two thirds of them girls, are not in school. Of the world's 875 million illiterate adults, two thirds are women.



News from the health team

It was late Friday afternoon; I received a phone call from Dr.Trieu from Da Nang General Hospital to ask if we can support for surgery's cost for an emergency case. According to him, this child was unconscious when admitting to hospital and after 5 hours attempting to rescue her, her heart started to work again but this little girl must have her heart operated within 3 days; otherwise they all do not know what will happen. CHIA procedures aside, we came up with the answer "yes" to this case after only 5 minutes in discussion with CHIA's founder, Ms. Robyn. Although there are many children who need heart surgeries, we considered this case to be a priority.

Her name is Chuyen and she is a 9 year old girl who lives with her parents and 2 younger sisters in their ethnic minority community of Quang Nam province. I went to visit Chuyen just hours before she had surgery; she has a very cute look with her big eyes. When I first communicated to her father, we hardly understood each other because he could only speak a bit of the Kinh (Vietnamese) language. The whole family's living relies on planting sugar-cane and peanuts. Chuyen was faint sometimes but her parents didn't think the severity of her health condition till she had difficulty in breathing and was admitted to hospital. Luckily, she was cared for by these great doctors and I was informed by Dr. Trieu that she had a very successful surgery. Thanks to doctors of cardiovascular department, Chuyen's life was rescued and is having a speedy recovery.






Let us celebrate !

Gabi Neave is at retirement age, when many people like to take holidays or a rest after their many years of work.



News from the therapy team

Although Hoi An is near the beach, many of the community can not swim! The UN estimates that nationwide 40 children die every day from drowning. Many of the CHIA staff can not swim, however recently 3 of our physiotherapy team were invited to participate in the TriBob learn-to-swim program.

Our physiotherapists believe that swimming is very necessary for a good and healthy life, keeping our bodies strong and bringing us good spirit for working. In addition you can save yourself or save others from drowning.

Our physio team are hoping to develop a regular hydrotherapy program for our disabled children. As may of you know, hydrotherapy is a physio treatment which can bring wonderful benefits to children suffering from different disabilities.

Hydrotherapy stimulates these children to do physiotherapy to keep their body stronger and prevent their body from more contractures. With the support from Australian volunteer Donna, the team received basic training in hydrotherapy and after this activity, they were able to identify that hydrotherapy is a good treatment for many children at CHIA. We hope to be able to continue with this program during next summer.

Thanks to the Tribob crew and Donna for kick starting our hydrotherapy plans.





The weather during the summer in Viet Nam is hot and can make our work difficult, especially when attempting to serial cast some of our disabled children.

Serial casting is a new skill learnt by our physio team and with training and support from Donna we attempted to plaster the feet of two children in the hope that this would reduce contractures and correct the foot position in preparation for further corrective surgery.

After several castings we were able to take these these children to Da Nang Orthopedic and Rehabilitation Hospital for assessment by a visiting specialist. We are thrilled to learn that one of the children will receive correction surgery.

Due to other complications one of the children is unable to undergo surgery, however will now be available to use a pair of custom built shoes to support her shorter leg and give her more balance when she is standing and allow her do more physiotherapy with equipment.

Annually CHIA is blessed with many volunteers who come and work with our team and children. Our most recent physiotherapy volunteer Donna has returned home after nearly three months working with our disability team.

During the 3 months that Donna was with us my colleagues and I were able to improve our skills and knowledge in physiotherapy and we were able to learn new techniques like plastering and using Theratogs to improve children's ability to walk independently. *Written by*
